PROGRAM NOTE

Ideas of Vision (2008) is a three movement work for solo cello, inspired by the *Trois Strophes sur le nom de Sacher* of French composer Henri Dutilleux. Below I have presented an excerpt of the larger composition, the third movement alone. As in Dutilleux's piece, a grouping of four fundamental pitch classes (G, Ab, C#, Bb) guides the compositional structure, as the use of wideranging extended techniques adds an essential color to the texture. One guiding compositional principle was the use of juxtapositions between drastically different playing techniques. These include sudden timbral shifts between musical figures marked *pianissimo flautando*, to aggressive *fortissimo* double stops. Further, alterations between passages written without a clear meter, *senza misura*, to those with a more regular rhythmic pulse are set off against each other. This back and forth between opposing gestures and sense of unfolding time creates a clear dialogue, as if two performers were responding to one another. Drawing further from Dutilleux's work, I also sought to intentionally blur the boundaries between musical gestures that sound more like practicing, i.e. improvisational riffs, to those that sound more intentional and formalized. Overall, the movement is one of intense energy and virtuosic playing on the part of the performer. The composition was premiered by Benjamin Karp, Professor of cello at the University of Kentucky, in January 2009.



- 1) All notes with small noteheads, and rests of reduced size, should be performed rapidly with no sense of meter.
- 2) All three note chords, unless otherwise notated, should be performed sounding all three notes at once.
